ROOTING WILD AZALEA CUTTINGS

By Sarah Gillespie, Hattiesburg, MS

d that the middle to the end of May was the best time, taking n the usual manner and dipping the ends in Rootone. I try to e cutting before they get mature enough to snap like a match. I use the green metal two gallon cans used by nurseries. The ith the square holes in the sides above the bottom. Fill the alf full with Perlite that has been well soaked. Use a match to poke holes for the cutting and then firm the Perlite. Cover ns with clear plastic, like the kind that comes from the cleaners e securely below the rim. Place the cans in large clay saucers re kept filled with water. Put the cans under fluorescent lights e duration. By September I have fine root growth with near 100 t results.

tried cutting from mid-April through June and find May best for a. I have also tried different rooting media and like Perlite with half Perlite and Vermiculite the next best.

the rooted cuttings in peat pots filled with a mixture of potting nd Perlite and cover with plastic and harden off.
