# News from Clinton Community Nature Center, MS Native Plant Society, and the MS Environmental Education Alliance

#### Damage from Hurricane Katrina at the Nature Center-President Cox reports

The Nature Center sustained more damage from Katrina than anything else in our history, but compared to the massive catastrophes elsewhere, this urban forest fared well. We lost about 25 large trees which damaged many younger trees as they fell. Some crashed into and over the fence into neighbors' properties. The fence was breached in 5 places, the amphitheatre stage was destroyed, and one section of boardwalk was broken by a tree.

How can you help? We need volunteers

to help with the work, both clean-up and repair. We need donations for fence repair and for materials to repair the stage at the amphitheatre, boardwalk, and trails. Joining forces to reach our members with important news from each group, the Nature Center, MEEA, and MNPS have coordinated

their reports in this newsletter. If everyone contributes, it can keep us all informed of activities, events, and issues of concern to us as individuals and organizations. This edition comes close on the heels of Katrina and reports of damage to the natural world of MS have been stunning. The city of Laurel alone is estimated to

have lost 1000 trees. Many of the salt damaged trees and other plants left standing on the Gulf Coast will recover, but the issue of restoring our barrier islands looms large, as does restoration and reforestation. Crosby Arboretum in Picayune sustained considerable damage to the visitors' center, but the pavillion lost only a few boards. The Lynn Meadows Discovery Center took a hard hit to the classroom annex. More questions remain about how municipalities will deal with debris, and if any of it will be used to enhance habitat. Still, many are reporting the abundance of

hummers at feeders this fall. Now word comes from Holly Springs that 2005 is, in every way, a banner year for ruby-throats. The 6th annual celebration of the hummingbird migration was held in September at Strawberry Plains Audubon Center with 4000 festivalgoers and countless hummingbirds - surely a sign of better days to come for all of us.



## Saturday programs, Special Events in Community and Urban Forestry Challenge Grant

The Nature Center has received a Community and Urban Forestry Challenge Program grant (MFC). Environmental Education Outreach and Support will enable us to fill these positions:

#### Teacher Connectivity Project Report: EE Workshops, Class Field Trips, and Buddy Kits



In July, the Nature Center welcomed dozens of teachers to a full week of exciting environmental education workshops. Since the Teacher Connectivity Project began in 2002, more

than 200 teachers have attended similar workshops, but this was the Center's biggest single week. Again we were able to host the teachers at no cost to them. Registration, materials, mileage, and CEU fees were provided by our partners for Teacher Connectivity: MS Forestry Commission, MS Natural Science Museum, Hinds County Soil and Water Conservation District, US EPA, and Community Foundation for Greater Jackson. Jr. Civic League of Clinton enabled us to provide the entire week's lunches. Kudos to our Educator, Johnny Broussard, who is now certified to facilitate these

workshops: Project Learning Tree, Project Wild, Project Archaeology, and Food, Land, & People. We look forward to welcoming these teachers and their students to the Center for field trips this year. #### Entergy Mississippi: Environmental Stewardship Grant, Amphitheatre lighting project



Since the Nature Center was founded, Entergy Mississippi has contributed to its development with

grant funds for projects such as the Discovery Table in Price Hall and environmental control systems for the greenhouse. Through Entergy's Environmental Stewardship program and with inkind and supplemental funding, we continue this important partnership in Center development. In July, 'Moonlight & Mosquitoes' was the first time a program was held at night outdoors in the woods, but it won't be the last, thanks to Entergy Mississippi. The evening was a big success with Chairman Nancy Anderson, a host of volunteers and temporary lighting. We will be able to install permanent outdoor lighting at the same time we repair the storm damage to the stage. In addition,

trail and exhibit improvements will be part of <u>Urban Forest Habitat Enhancement</u>. The project was awarded Entergy Environmental Stewardship Grant in July. Special thanks to the Center's strong cadre of friends among current and retired Entergy employees for their devotion to the Center's continuing

development.
